Our school uniform policy is as follows:

All School

All children should wear black, flat, comfortable sensible footwear. (No trainers/sandals or boots). From Year 1 black sandshoes to be worn in and around the school.

No jewellery allowed other than flat studs.

(Foundation Stage)

Spare clothing to be provided in a named bag, which will stay at school in case of accidents or getting too wet during the day. It would be helpful if your child could always have a waterproof jacket or suit and wellies so that they can fully immerse themselves in their outdoor learning without getting too cold and wet. (Children don't always feel the cold like we do, so do not always complain if their shoes or clothes are wet!)

Children should not wear lace up shoes in Foundation Stage.

Naming clothes

The Reuniform project is based at Trinity Methodist Church in Hull. It was set up in July 2019 as an initial idea of Emma Hardy MP, involving many other churches across Hull.

The project collects and redistributes used school uniform from across Hull and surrounding areas.
